We are very pleased that patients with lung malignancies are now able to have their treatment at Weston instead of having to travel to Bristol. This will reduce the amount of time, stress and cost travelling to Bristol for their appointments with their consultant and for their chemotherapy.

As winter approaches we are actively encouraging patients and staff to have both the COVID and Flu vaccinations. All the staff on OHDU have received their booster for COVID and their annual Flu vaccination.

Advice that we give to patients having chemotherapy:

It is really important to try our best to keep well especially when you are having chemotherapy. If you do feel unwell or develop any symptoms it's vitally important that you ring the acute oncology service (AOS) for advice as soon as symptoms develop. Please don't turn up to your planned appointment unwell as this puts yourself and other patients at risk.

On a lighter note, we are working with Bristol to try and strengthen and improve our services here. Over the next few months you may see your nurses with clipboards and doing lots of writing. They are trying to capture data around the amount and type of work that they currently do so that we can work more efficiently and plan ahead as we grow.

New Monthly Haematology Support Group

We support our patient to best of our abilities but sometimes the best support and reassurance can come from people who have walked in their shoes. We aim to bring patients together and enable them to support each other in a way nobody else can.

Macmillan Cancer & Domestic Abuse project team

If you are interested in being a part of the 2024 Macmillan Professionals Conference which will be held in Cardiff you can do this in three ways:

- 1. Be nominated or nominate yourself for an Excellence Award.
- 2. Submit a Poster about an element of your work
- 3. Apply to be a delegate

The first way to attend, be nominated for an award is time consuming, as you must complete a nomination form, if shortlisted you then have to submit a presentation to a panel of Judges, if you are chosen to be a finalist for an award you are invited to the whole event as a priority. Nominations for an Excellence Award open in May of 2024. There are usually four categories.

The second way to attend, submit a Poster – Submissions for the poster open around May 2024. Poster topics are initially submitted then you will be asked to produce a poster. You may be asked to talk about or explain the poster in one of the break out sessions, this would be agreed in advance. You are invited to the full conference and also the Awards ceremony.

The third way is to apply for a place in September when applications to attend the event are opened to all Macmillan Professionals to apply for a place. Notification that you can apply for a place come via Mac Mail so please do make sure that you let me know if you are not receiving this.
