# Colorectal Cancer Nurse Specialist team - Ceri, Madeline and Lynn

We are the colorectal cancer nurse specialists at United Hospitals Bristol and Weston based at Weston General Hospital consisting of a team of 3-soon to be 4 Macmillan sponsored nurses.

We are involved from point of cancer diagnosis (anal, rectal, colon) and continue to support patients and their carers through their treatment plan/pathway. For example surgery/chemotherapy/radiotherapy/palliative therapies.



We also run a nurse lead colorectal cancer surveillance program for patients who have had curative treatment and are on a five year follow up. This involves requesting and monitoring blood tests and investigations including CT scans, MRI scans and colonoscopies and communicating the results to our patients via a health portal where patients can also contact us.

Treatment options are continuously changing with the introduction of robotic surgery and the role of immunotherapies. Having a fourth team member will allow our service to improve and develop. Our aims are to develop nurse led clinics for post-operative patients, pre oral chemotherapy assessments, 2 week wait triage, clinics for genetic counselling for patients with hereditary cancer (Lynch syndrome).

### **Fundraising on behalf of the Macmillan Support centre**

There has been some amazing fundraising for the Macmillan Centre over the past few months

In what has become an annual event two skittle teams the Day Dreamers and the Destroyers play a charity skittles match in memory of Howard Broomhall who played for the Day Dreamers. Howard died of brain cancer in Weston hospital in 2022 and Macmillan really supported him and Hayley his partner (who plays for the Destroyers) throughout his last three months in hospital. They were so grateful for the support, so they have played a charity match against each other in his memory each year since his passing, this is arranged by his team captain, Kerry, it is always such good fun, the Day Dreamers won the first year and the Destroyers won this year, so it stands at 1 all and all to play for next year. Money is also raised throughout the summer season by holding raffles at all home matches and the big raffle and silent auction at the charity night. Next year they hope to raise even more money for Macmillan to help other patients and their loved ones going through the same struggles that they did.



In November the Congresbury Horseshow and Gymkhana raised £1500 which they split donating £1000 to the Macmillan Centre and £500 to the nurses amenity fund.
